



Many Marvel At Lighting **Effects**

Perisphere Draws Most Comments At Night

Of all the wonderful lighting effects in the World of Tomorrow, the Perisphere receives the largest number of queries. The question asked most often is, "How do they make it appear to be moving?

There are 270 great floodlights from batteries of 400 watt mercury vapor capillary lamps, with fresnel lenses, mounted on roofs of the nearest buildings. These lights, which bathe the giant structure in either dark blue or deep maroon, give cloud effects to the top of the sphere. Then the group of lights aimed at the central part of the ball are kept moving, and this constant motion plus the crossing of the different beams result in apparent movement of the sphere.

At the beginning, the Perisphere was given only the dark blue coloring, but in the last few weeks it has alternately been bathed in deep maroon. The reason for the change was simply one of variety. Most spectators believe the red gives the sphere a more beautiful to behold" appearance. but that the blue allows for a better illusion movement.


