Canine Marshal **Adds Novelty** Today



# **Invitation Greets Visitors At** Rhode Island's Fair Exhibit

Under a large, decorative state map the following message from Governor William H. Vanderbilt extends a welcome to visitors of the Rhode Island exhibits in the New England Warehouse at the New York World's

"Rhode Island invites you to the land of Roger Williams, founded 300 years ago, where the spirit of freedom in all things, religious and civil, has developed a proud sovereign state."

The Rhode Island wing is a cheerful, colorful room designed by Dr. Royal B. Farnum and Albert Harkness, of the New York World's Fair Commission of Rhode Island, in collaboration with the other members of the Commission. The exhibit pre-sents to the visitor a series of pictorial maps of the state, some historical features and most prominently presents the manufactur-ing interests of the Rhode Island of our time. Decoration of the is the time when the King of room, insofar as is possible, is by Rhode Island-made products.

Of unique interest is the exhibit of American-made laces, which appear in a spotlighted panel on the wall, facing the mural. Here are laces of silk, cotton and rayon, and all cotton in edgings, bands, galloons, and dress widths produced on the machines of the American Textile Co.

This mill is the largest in America and was established in 1899. At present there are 65 machines in the plant, which employ from 300 to 350 workers. In the state of Rhode Island there are 22 lace mills, which proves that this is the center of American lace making as there are but 42 lace mills in the entire United States.

A series of white pla ues are also used for wall decorations. These symbolize the state activities of fishing, agriculture, arts, and industry and were conceived and executed by John H. Benson, professor of sculpture at the Rhode Island School of Design, and his students.

The exhibit is dominated by a heroic-sized statue of Roger Williams by Leo Friedlander, a duplicate of the model used in carving the large figure which was unveiled on Prospect Terrace, Providence, June 29. Mr. Friedlander is the sculptor who created the four heroic figures at the World's Fair known as the "Four Free-



# 'Boy Meets Girl'—And Flapjacks Fly Thick and Fast at Fair

A selected group of six Scouts from the Boy Scout Service Camp at the World's Fair have challenged an equal number of Camp Fire Girls to a flapjack baking contest as a feature of the celebration of Camp Fire Girls Day at the Fair in the Boy Scout Service Camp at 2 P.M.

The judges selected the recipe by Mrs. Florence Steingut of New York City and awarded her the prize of \$100.

This is the recipe for the "Pie of Tomorrow":

½ cup sugar
4 tablespoons flour
2 egg yolks
few grains of salt
2 tablespoons butter

2 tablespoons butter
54 cup milk
11/4 cup cream
1 square unsweetened chocolate
11/4 cup prune pulp
1/4 pound chopped pecans
1/2 cup diced Maraschino cherries and
citron

Mix flour and sugar together; add milk, beaten egg yolks, prune pulp, diced Maraschino cherries, citron and pecans. Cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add salt and butter. Pour mixture into a baked crisp pie shell. Cool. Beat cream until stiff. Add a dash of vanilla. Add melted chocolate to one-third of whipped cream. Spread white whipped cream on pie. Streak melted chocolate whipped cream into the white to give a marbled effect.
