Housing Experts Meet at Fair To Discuss World Problems

Iraq Pavilion Holds Date Festival

Dates and Valuable
Prizes Will Be
Given Away

The court behind the Iraq Pavilion at the Fair will be turned into a pleasant oasis with free dates (the kind you eat), entertainment, and opportunities to win valuable prizes, as Iraq celebrates its day at the Fair.

An exciting show will be staged at 2:30 P.M. when a native Arabian camel driver puts "Tracy," the dromedary from Frank Buck's Jungleland, through his paces for the visitors. The camel will do every conceivable trick, and according to advance notices the show will be a plus value in entertainment.

Over 25,000 packages of Iraq dates will be handed out to those who come to attend the show. Iraq produces 80 percent of all the dates that are sold throughout the world and the celebration of Iraq Day will be a Date Festival. (Please Turn to Page Two)

Secretary Of Labor Perkins Will Speak This Evening Climaxing Housing Day

A round-table discussion; a gala dinner this evening; and addresses by prominent people in public life headed by Miss Frances Perkins, U. S. Secretary of Labor, will focus the attention of this World of Tomorrow on the housing problem both here and throughout the world as the Fair celebrates National Public Housing Conference Day.

The round-table discussion will take place this afternoon between 5:15 and 6 P.M. in the Little Theatre of the Science and Education Building. Participants will be a group of American housing experts who attended the International Housing and Town Planning Congress in Stockholm last month and subsequently observed housing conditions and programs now under way in Great Britain and Continental Europe.

The discussion will be lead by Helen Alfred, director of the National Public Housing Conference. Irving Brandt, of the Editorial Staff of the St. Louis Star-Times, a consultant for the Department of the Interior, and leader of the 4th European Housing Study Tour of the National Public Housing Authority, will be the leading speaker of the panel of experts.

Others participating include: Leon H. Keyserling, Deputy Administrator, U. S. Housing Authority; Edward Weinfeld, Administrator, New York State Housing Division; and Alfred Rheinlein, New York City Housing Bureau. (Please Turn to Page Two)

Iraq Pavilion Holds Date Festival

In ten of the packages of dates given away there will be tickets entitling the holder to a free dinner at the Iraq Pavilion "Garden of Eden" Restaurant. Here the food is cooked according to recipes that come direct from Bagdad, and the exotic flavor of the Far East is to be found in every mouthful.

Aside from the production of dates, Iraq is also famous for the quality and delicacy of the silver-work done by its native craftsmen. In celebration of the Day there will be 10 lucky tickets entitling the holders to receive a solid silver hand made ring.

Abbas Amarah, a native Subbean silversmith, will fit the rings to the finger of the winners. He will also inscribe on the ring a talisman of fortune in Arabic.

This native craftsman has been at the Iraq Pavilion since the opening of the Fair. He displays for visitors the delicate filigreed silver work he has wrought and also demonstrates how the work is done. Abbas Amarah is descended from a long line of silversmiths; his father and his grandfather before him were silversmiths and he learned the craft from them. He worked for five years with the precious metal before he was permitted to work with his father as an apprentice. Then it was five years more before he was actually allowed to attempt to take the responsibility of work on his own shoulders.

The rings to be distributed today will mark the first time these hand made silver rings from the artful hands of the Subbean silversmiths have ever been so distributed in America. They will be engraved with ancient Assyrian and Babylonian designs.

Following the readings, a vote by the audience will be taken to determine the article judged to be the most meritorious.

The 26 saddle horses and jumpers used by the Haskell Indian Guard of Honor on duty at the World's Fair until recently, will be auctioned today at the Alley Pond Stables, Douglaston, L. I., according to W. O. Schirmer, coordinator of the Fair Purchasing Department.

Equipment comprising saddles, bridles, saddle housings and pads also will be put on sale. The Honor Guard escorted President Roosevelt, the King and Queen of England and scores of other dignitaries on their visits to the Fair. It was disbanded on August 25 to permit the Indians to return to Haskell College.

Preceding the round-table discussion, there will be a special showing of several housing films at the Little Theatre. Among these will be the much discussed film "The City," specially produced to be shown at the World's Fair. This film has its premier at the Little Theatre of the Science and Education Building, and has continued to draw capacity crowds since its opening.

Mrs. Simkhovitch, president of the National Public Housing Conference, will preside at the dinner at 7:30 P.M. in the garden of the Swedish Pavilion. This dinner, at which Secretary Perkins will be the principal speaker, will climax the celebration of National Public Housing Conference Day.

Other speakers will include: Dr. Thurman W. Arnold, Assistant Attorney General; Mayor Fiorello H. LaGuardia; and Housing Administrator Nathan Strauss.

During the morning the delegates to the Conference will have an opportunity to tour the various foreign pavilions at the Fair.

In line with the Fair's new policy of providing spectacular free entertainment for visitors an extravagant musical program will be staged in the Court of Peace this afternoon at one o'clock. Led by the famous Gene Krupa, a program of drum music and drum dances will pound out the compelling rhythms that have stirred human passions through eternity.

Krupa, whose mad antics at the traps are the delight of the jitterbugs, will strut his stuff and also will act as master of ceremonies. He will tell the story of drums as they have been played through the ages in every land and era.

Native drummers from all over the world will take part. As each one plays, Krupa will explain the significance and history of the drum about to be played. Krupa will also show the development of the art of drumming from its jungle inception to the present day concert and swing technique.

As a grand climax to the show, Gene Krupa's band will play the maestro's own arrangement of "Blue Rhythm Fantasy" and the whole Fair will reverberate with sound as the entire ensemble joins in the crashing drum finale.

Native drummers from the Dominican Republic will play the ancient instrument of their country, the tambora. In the course of this strange instrument, native dancers will perform the Merengue, a Dominican dance similar to the rumba.

Exhibit Tracing Race Prejudice Opened To Lay Bare Its Source

A special exhibit of books and original charts analyzing race and race prejudice was opened in the Hall of Science and Education of the World's Fair yesterday by Dr. Gerald Wendt, the Fair's director of science and education, and Professor Franz Boas, famous anthropologist.

"The swift movement of destructive events," Dr. Wendt said in welcoming the installation of the exhibit, "has recently shown again the appalling power of misunderstanding, ignorance and hatred. We in this country feel that our ideals of democracy and of fairness to all have saved us from such a fate. If so, it is because we have always tried in this country to understand each other and to take all the facts into account. We have not feared unknown forces and unknown people but have made every effort to learn all about them. Understanding and mutual respect have brought us peace."

"It is vital that this American custom be maintained. The strife of prejudice and propaganda can be combated only with knowledge. American Rediscovery Week will focus attention on the facts and principles that are fundamental to democracy and will throw the searchlight on the fatal misunderstandings which have wrought so much havoc and injustice. This exhibit at the World's Fair and the great series of meetings to be held here during American Rediscovery Week are valuable to all. It is fitting that this exhibit be placed in the Hall of Science and Education and even more fitting that the meetings be held in the Court of Peace."

Professor Boas, national chairman of the American Committee for Democracy and Intellectual Freedom, pointed out that the books included in the exhibit

were carefully selected according to the views on race accepted by the great majority of American anthropologists, as summarized in a resolution unanimously adopted by the American Anthropological Association last December, which said in part: "Anthropology provides no scientific basis for discrimination against any people on the ground of racial inferiority, religious affiliation or linguistic heritage."

"Ignorance, prejudice and unwillingness to examine uncongenial facts," Dr. Boas stated, "are elements that endanger the well-being of a republic which is governed by the will of the people. The American Committee for Democracy and Intellectual Freedom considers it one of its main tasks to lay bare the sources of prejudice, and by this means to help create an atmosphere in which freedom of thought can flourish."

Since the beginning of the Fair, the Cycle Trades exhibit has been staging races every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday evenings.

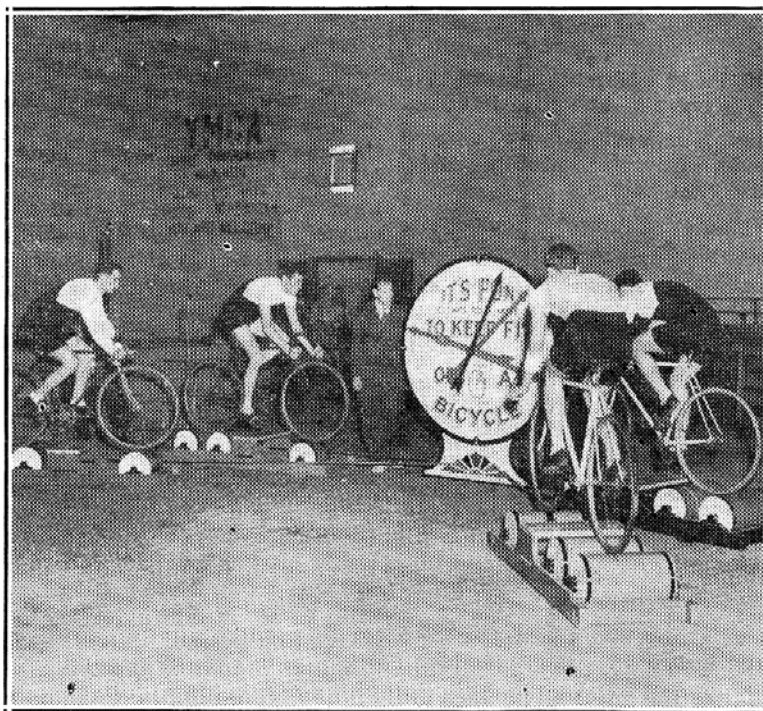

Paul Specht's Orchestra Offers Variety Of Fun At Casino

Few visitors to the Fair know that the Casino of Nations is a reincarnation of the famous place of the same name in the Paris Exposition of 1937.

It is exactly that, plus several added features to make it harmonize with the spirit of the World of Tomorrow. One of these is the modern fluorescent lighting system, which had not been invented at the time of the Paris Fair, and another is the elaborate entertainment program which is reminiscent of Paris but with the flavor of the greatest New York night clubs.

Outstanding among the attractions is Paul Specht and his orchestra, playing from 5.30 to 9 o'clock and from 10 to 11:30 P.M. There are 18 artists in this assemblage by the world famous maestro of presidential inaugural balls. Every member of the aggregation is a soloist, so that a great variety of entertainment is furnished by them, besides the celebrated Paul Specht rhythm for dancing on a great oval-shaped floor.

Two of the group are vocalists entirely—Lady Vine, "The Songbird of the South," who received a bouquet and badge on opening night from Dorothy Jones, director of the Tennessee State Exhibit, and Ed Red Evans, the "Boop poop-a-doop Man." Two players in the band also are featured vocally. Elmer Davis, 350 pound bass fiddle manipulator, presents comic fat-boy songs, and Clyde Rogers sings tenor ballads.

When 6:15 P.M. arrives, the program from the Paul Specht entertainers goes on the Fair's public-address system, and is heard over the loud-speakers throughout the grounds, letting visitors know that the show is now under way.

Both inside and outside, the Casino of Nations presents a gala

appearance. With flags flying from the roof, representing every nation participating in the Fair, it is one of the first things seen by visitors arriving by the LIRR gate. It is in the heart of the exhibit area, midway between the Hall of Communications and the Telephone exhibit, and less than a minute's walk from the Perisphere and Trylon or the entrance for the I. R. T. and B. M. T. subways.

In both cuisine and conduct, the Continental accent is found. Victor Lauley, French aviator who conducted the Paris Casino of Nations so successfully, emphasizes the same standards and styles of his native land in both the table d'hôte and a la carte menus. He has provided arrangements whereby anything from a pick-me-up at the bar to the most sumptuous repast may be obtained.

Many interesting groups attending the Fair have held their luncheon, tea-time, dinner and supper meetings at the Casino of Nations. A recent one brought the demure young girls of 17 and 18 who had won distinction in the dairy-maid's beauty contest conducted by the Sheffield Farms-Slawson Decker Company. Their pictures were taken in a group with the famous Paul Specht autographing one of their distinctive menus in front of the microphone.

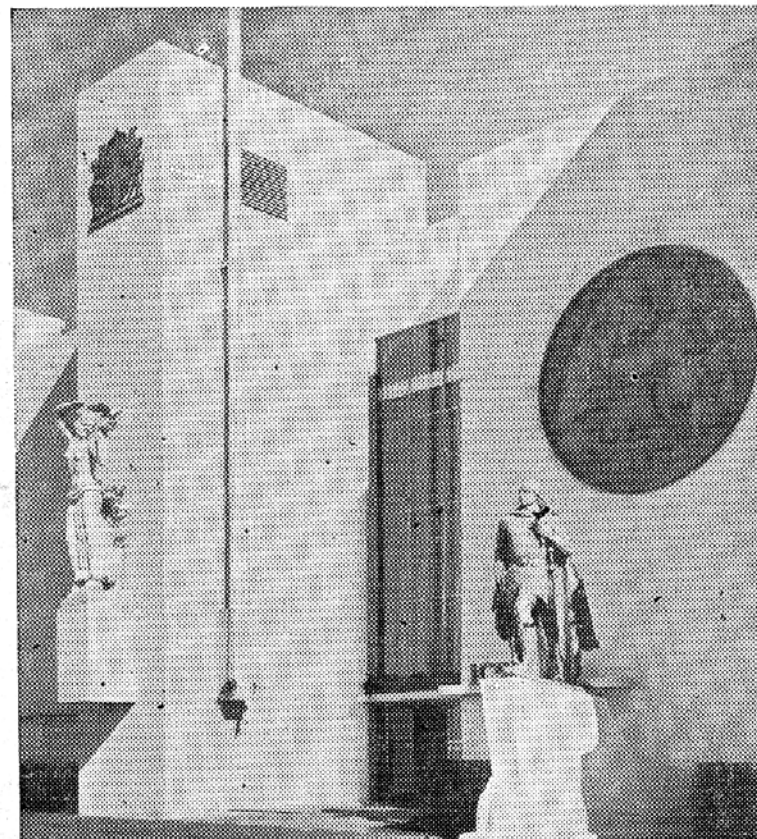

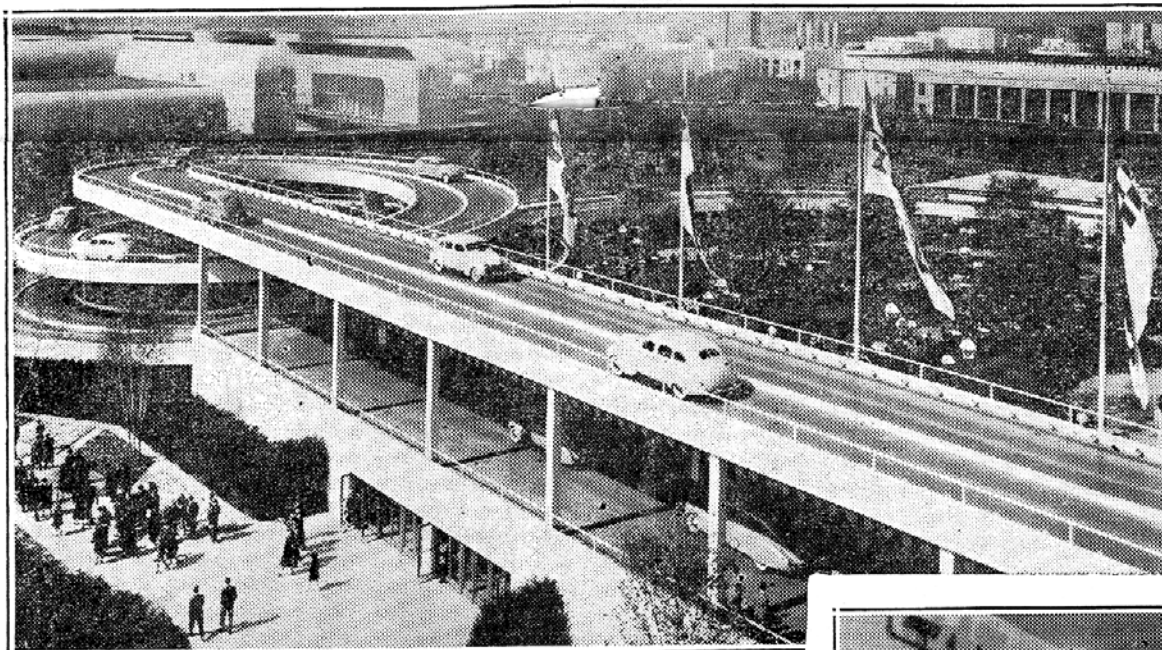
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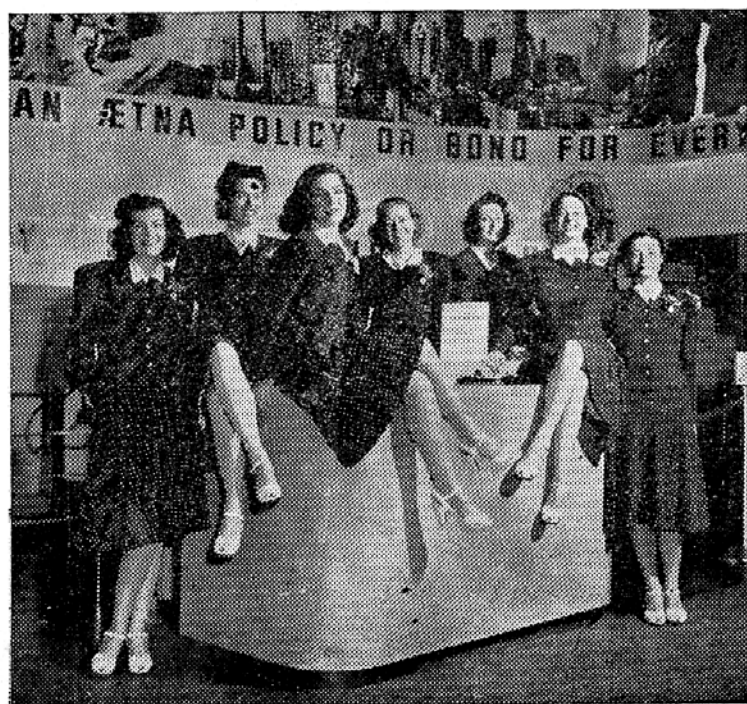
