The city-wide Junior Band will present a medley of American songs. The I. W. O. American People Chorus, under the direction of Earl Robinson, will present a group of songs.

The Chernishevsky Dancers, under the direction of Alex Karaczum, will perform.

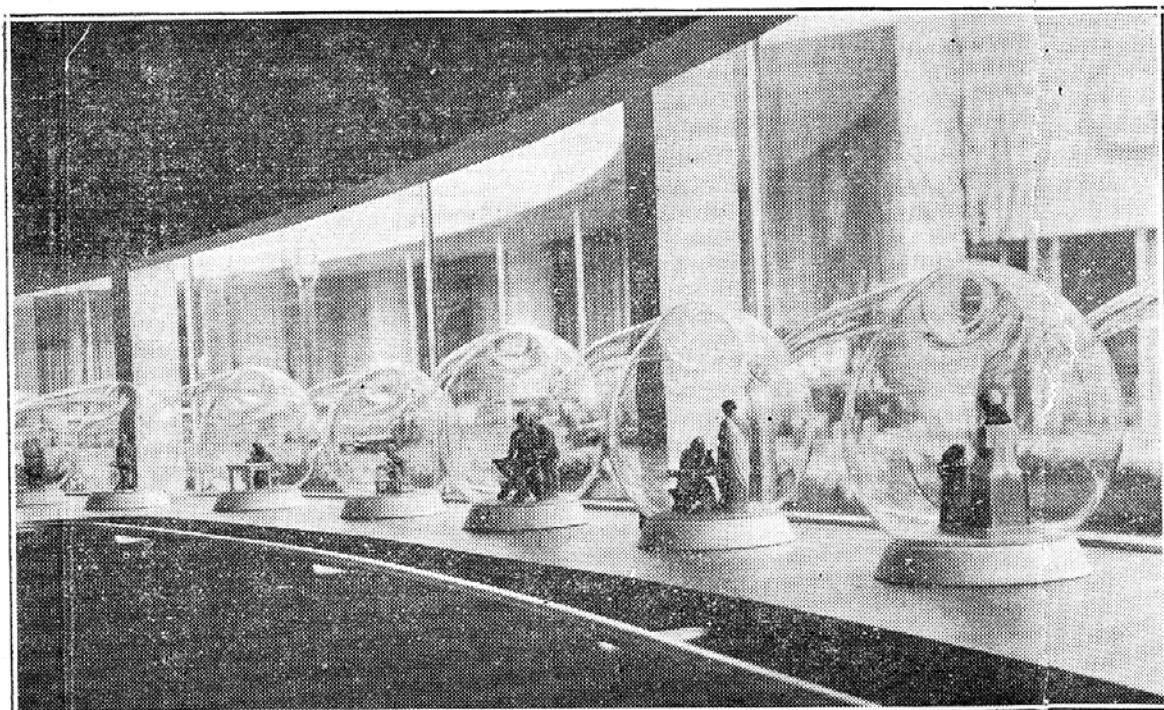
A part of the day's ceremonies will be devoted to a Junior Bugle and Drum Corps exhibition and impromptu competition.

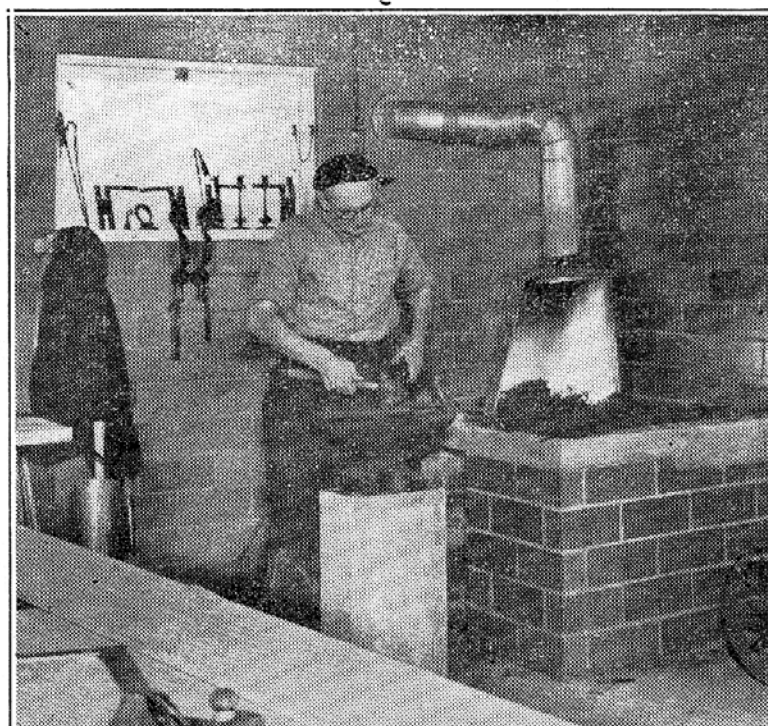

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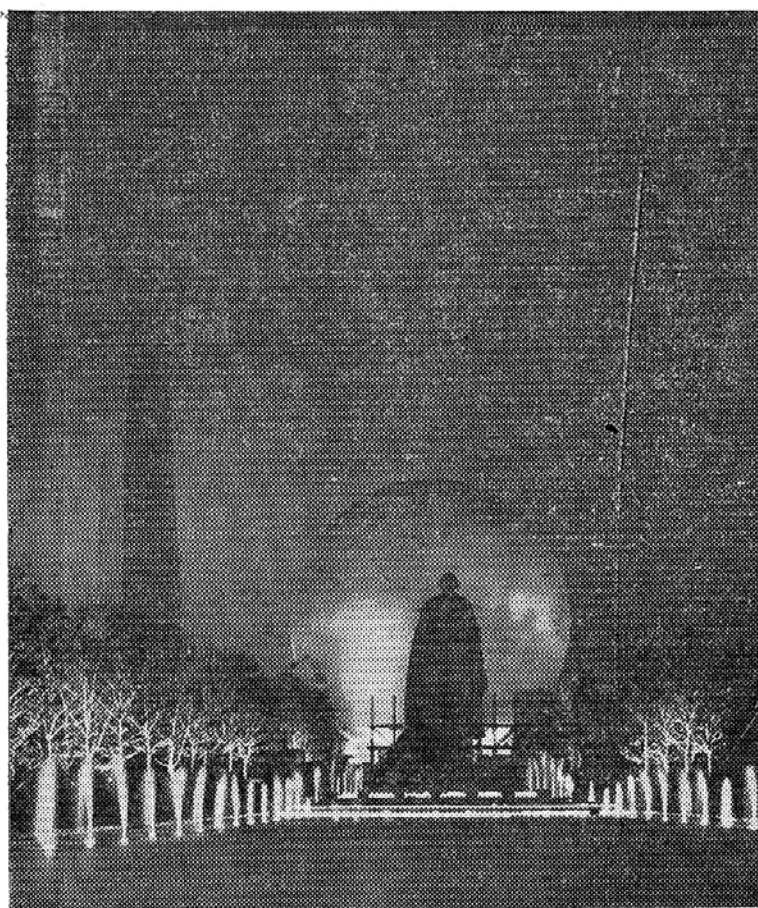
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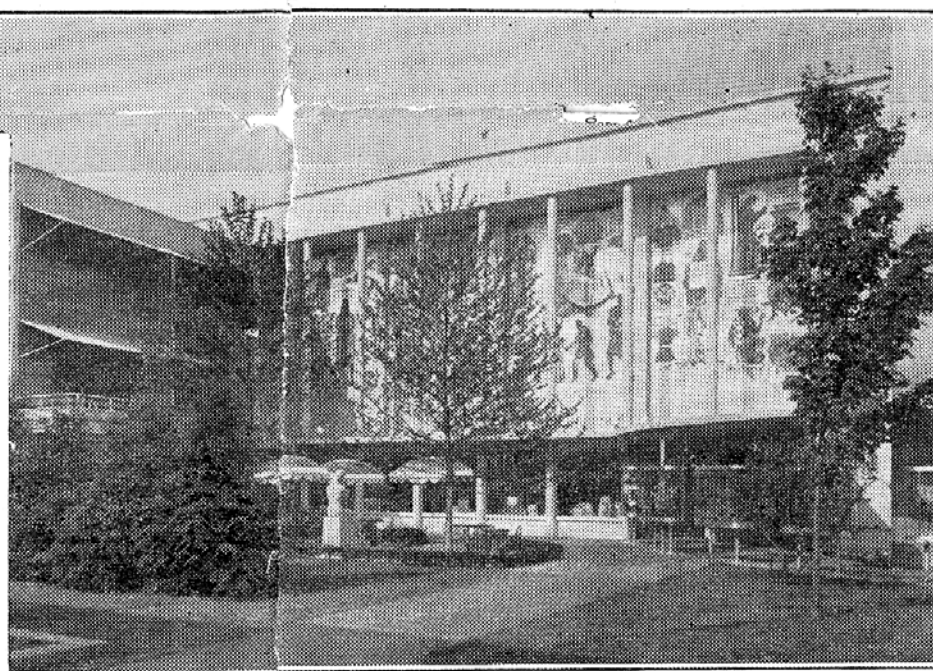

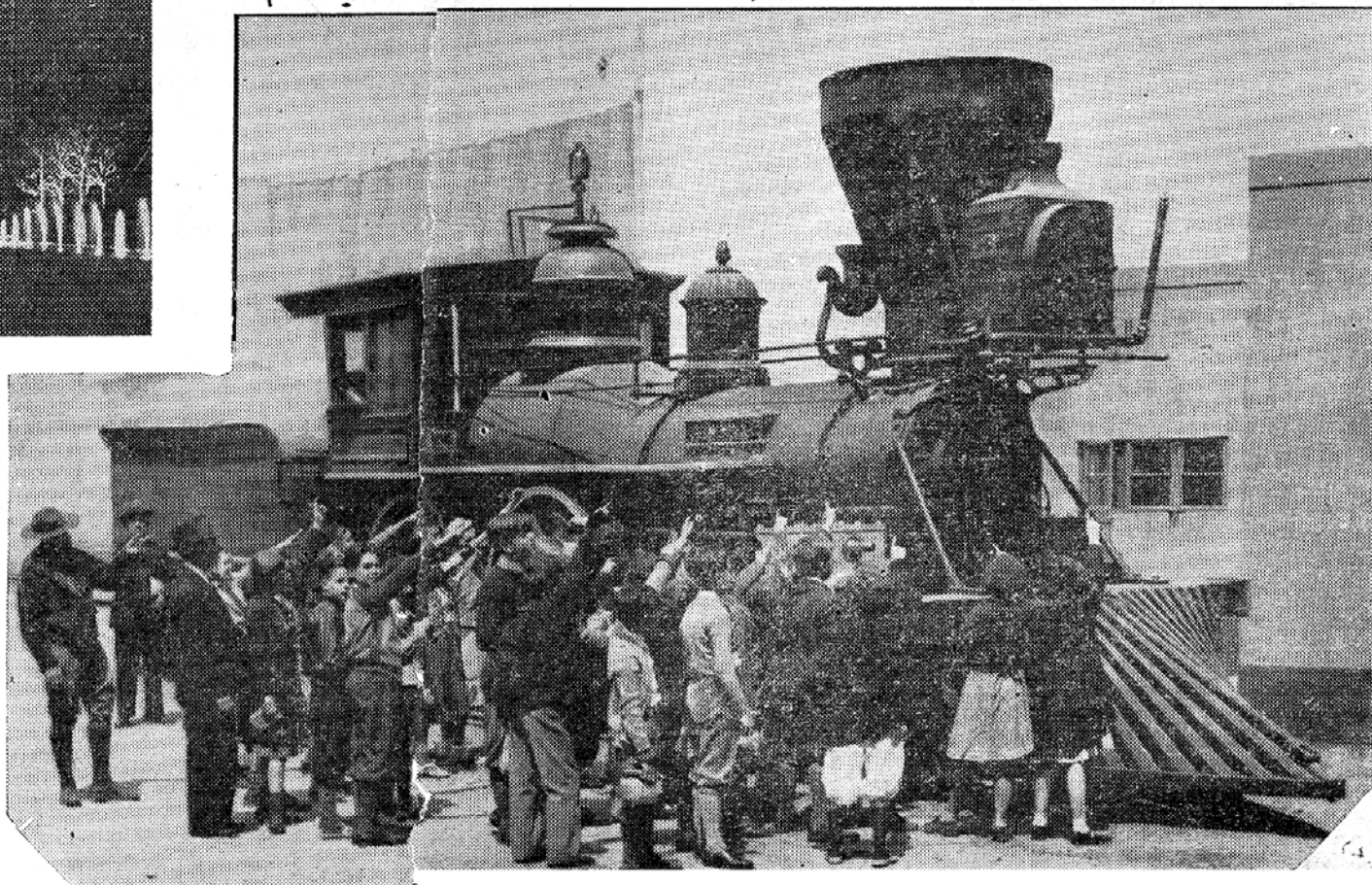

Hall That Made Fair History Closes in Ceremony Today

Washington Hall on Fountain Lake at the World's Fair, which Messmore Kendall, President General of the Sons of the American Revolution built at his own expense as a patriotic gesture, is closing its doors for this season with fitting ceremonies today at 5 P.M., when the flags will be lowered by the color guard for the last time.

Throughout the Fair's duration, this miniature replica of Mount Vernon served a triple purpose. In addition to housing a public museum, a collection of priceless Washington and revolutionary relics including those of Mr. Kendall himself, Washington Hall served as a meeting place for members of all patriotic societies; it was also the headquarters of the Patriots Club.

Howard Morris and David Quinn, both members of the Sons of the American Revolution, who traveled every day to the Fair to lower the flags at sunset will be members of the color guard in the closing ceremony.

Fair's Noted American Art Show To Be "Dispersed" at Close

The mammoth exhibition of Contemporary American Art assembled over a period of one and a half years by committees and juries numbering 500 people in forty-eight states will be dispersed at the close of the Fair, it is announced by the World's Fair corporation.

Art-conscious visitors to the Fair will therefore have only until October 31 to view the Gargantuan broadside of "American Art Today." Nearly a quarter of a million people have visited the exhibition this summer.

A common sight outside the great glass window at the front of the building is a crowd of people watching demonstrations of art processes going on inside. Over seventy artists have taken part in the daily demonstration programs, among them the well-known graphic artists, John Taylor Arms, Reginald Marsh, Isabel Bishop, William Auerbach-Levy and Luis Mora. How to model in clay and to carve in wood and stone has been shown by such world-famous artists as William Zorach, Consetta Scaravaglione, John Hovannes, Margaret Brassler Kane, and Ward Montague. Other sculpture demonstrations will be given before the close of the Fair.

Unique processes such as mosaic and silk-screening are also presented from time to time under the supervision of Ruth Reeves, the noted designer, and Anthony Velonis respectively, assisted by technical advisors and highly skilled craftsmen.

The former Federal Art Project, now known as the New York City Art Project, is responsible for 50 per cent of the demonstrations, in collaboration with the exhibition. Presses for etching, lithography, and wood engraving were installed in a miniature graphic arts workshop, supervised by Lynd Ward, well-known engraver. Among those demonstrating have been Russell Limbach, Isaac Sanger, Harry Gottlieb, Minna Citron, and others.

The program for the final week will include sculpture demonstrations, portrait painting.

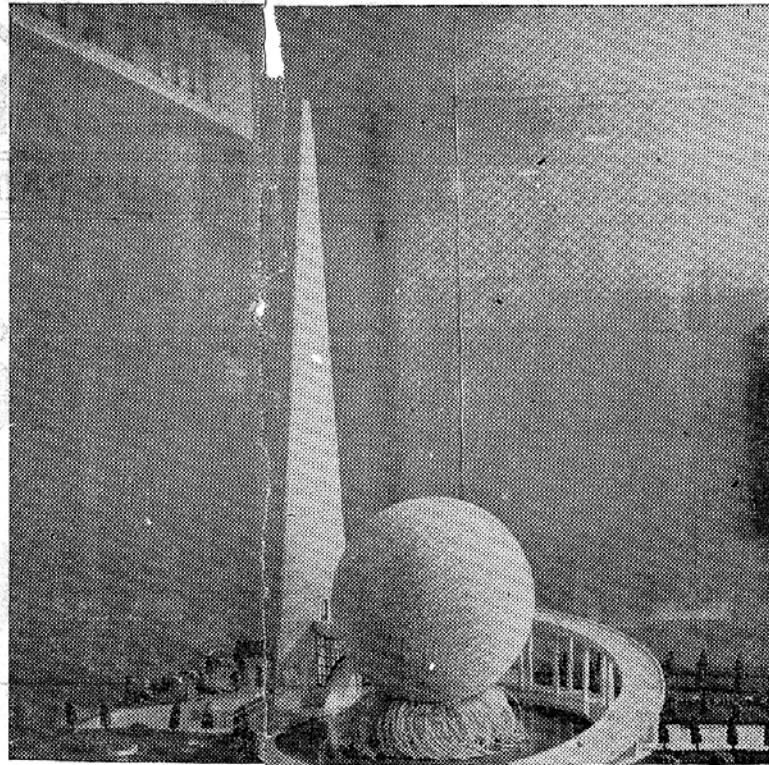
