Rene de Saint Quentin, French Ambassador to the United States, formally dedicates the French Pavilion on Constitution Mall at the Lagoon of Nations at 11 A.M.

Present at the ceremonies will be a galaxy of French and United States Government officials, representatives of the New York City and State Government, members of various French societies and organizations in New York and vicinity and other leaders in the city's business, artistic and social life.

Following the dedicatory rites, the Ambassador, his official party and other speakers and invited guests will visit the French Overseas Pavilion in the Hall of Na-tions where they will see ex-hibits devoted to French protectorates and possessions, including Mor cco.

Returning to the French Pavilion, the party will attend a reception there at which champagne and other refreshments will be served.

At 9 P.M. tonight the theatre in the Pavilion will be dedicated with impressive ceremonies. The inaugural show of the theatre will then be performed. Curtain time will be 10.30 P.M. At 11 P.M. a cold supper will be served to 500 guests.


The first concert by the Coldstream Guards Band, under the direction of Captain J. Causley Windram, will be given in the bandstand in the English garden at 2:45 P.M.





The age-old proverb, "Tomorrow never comes." has been discredited today as the curtain of time is drawn back at the "Hall of the Future," a feature of the United States Steel subsidiaries exhibit at the Fair.

COST \$100,000,000

There are more than 200 separate buildings in the Exhibit Area of the Fair alone. Their cost is well over \$100,000,000. And they tell the stories of industry, government, science and the arts with an effectiveness never before equalled.

Farms operated by radio control, prefabricated houses with rooms sliding in place like the drawers of a desk, and elevated pneumatic tubes in which the traveler will be sped to his destination by currents of air, all appear in model form.


The exhibit, in addition to telling the story of steel in the 'World of Tomorrow," gives dramatic representation of steel in the world of today. Animated dioramas, suggested by the keen interest that has been shown in the story of steel presented by the technicolor picture, "Steel—Man's Servant," bring close - up views of the steel industry.

Furnishing an opportunity for visitors to enjoy the spectacular beauty accompanying the handling of molten metal, the blast furnace and open-hearth dioramas reproduce pouring scenes in which lighting effects re-create the dazzling spectacles familiar to the steelworker.

Keyed to the theme of the exhibit, "Steel Thinks Ahead," the Hall of Research shows how scientists seek new fields of service for man's most useful metal and how intensive study of the properties of steel makes possible the steelmaker's control of more than a thousand different forms of his product.

The United States Steel Subsidiaries exhibit, located just east of the Fair's theme center, is housed in steel's "inside-out" house, with the supporting trusses forming a part of the building's streamlined exterior. The building, constructed in the form of a dome 66 feet high and 132 feet wide, has a skin made up of 28,000 feet of stainless steel, and the structure provides over 9,000 feet of exhibit


