Members of the Order of Hot Dog Fanciers and their guests are celebrating at the Fair today.


The invited guests are all persons named Hamurg, Hamburger, Frankfurt, Frankfurter, Mustard, Bun (n) and Roll.

The championship scrap finds the dancing girls of the Crystal Palace, led by Rosita Royce, lining up against the Ice Queens of Sun Valley, captained by Erna Anderson.

The match is the outcome of an incident at the Fair ten days ago. The girls of the Crystal Palace walked in to see the Ice Show and sneered at the Ice Queens, belittling their work. The Sun Valley Ice-maids promptly challenged them to a tug-of-war duel.

The conditions this Duchess of Bird-in-Hand rules match are that the losing team buy the winners ice cream cones, and that the losers permit the winnig team to play the hose upon them. Both teams are playing safe by wearing bathing suits.

Men Of Mars Lay Siege To Fair

Skipping New Jersey, the Men of Mars are descending in battle columns upon the World's Fair grounds, the Amusement Area to be precise, at 10:15 sharp tonight. Camp George Washington has volunteered to repulse the dire invaders.

The Martian attack was a military secret but spies discovered that Mars is closer to the Earth today than it will be again for the next 27 years. Now or not for 27 years, is the Martians' battle

Airplanes, anti-aircraft, guns and fire-works are ready to shoot down the Martians, descending in parachutes. For fifteen minutes Fountain Lake in the Amusement Area will be a bloody battle ground, a battle battle-sky as exploding bombs, smoke pots, red flares, magnesium lights (2,000 of them) and flashlights (an even dozen) bombard the Men of Mars.

The fireworks department at the Fair is stationed right beside the George Washington braves, along a wide battlefront. If that doesn't scare the Martians off and chase them back over the 36,035,-000 miles between their homegrounds and the Earth, there will be plenty of scientific eyes and master-minds watching them at the Time and Space Building, and 40 powerful electric ears will listen in on an experiment to send a radio signal to Mars and have it boomerang to the Earth.





Right in the World of Tomorrow is a perfect opportunity, to get full-fledged farm and barnyard pictures-at the Firestone Farm in the Transportation Area.

In a space of about two acres, there is a shady lane, a back pasture, a babbling brook, windmilt, farmhouse and a complete complement of farm stock, including ducks, geese, chickens, turkey, cows, goat, a horse and some sheep. All of which seem to be cognizant of the fact that they are good picture-material, and happy to pose.

Feeding-time on the farm is 5 P.M. There are always some good shots around that time.

Famous Ship Feature of Fair Exhibit

Gone are the days when ships with wings of canvas carried America's flag around the world, but true to old Yankee tradition, the New England exhibit features a replica of the type of vessel that made this country famous through the martime world.

The tall masts and yards of the good ship "Yankee" lured us to the Court of States. We mounted a gangway to her decks, the smell of hempen cordage and Stockholm tar strong in our nostrils, our minds filled with visions of the sea and ships in the days before steam hunted sail from the face of the deep.

Below in her after cabin, we met her stand-by captain-Lou Sylvia, seaman born, scion of an old family of New Bedford whalers. Just a young fellow Lou is, with sparkling eyes and a friendly manner typical of men who have the salt in their blood.

"Of course, she ain't a real ship," Lou explained, "just a reproduction of the "Ohio," a threemasted full-rigger, launched at Kingston, Mass., in 1830." But we could tell that he liked her. "Want to see my daily log?" His eyes lit up.

This is what we read: "The day came in with fresh south winds, and a strange bearded lubber who insisted that this old vessel has no bottom. While spitting to wind'ard, he demanded to see the hawsepipes and was quite put out when he found no horses. Demanded to see the cat and fish, and couldn't understand how we could "cat and fish" the anchor without 'em. Still insistent about the Yankee's bottom. Wonder what he'd have said if I'd told him there were three tops-fore, main, and mizzon?"



Snapshot Contest Drawing To Close

The third of the monthly Ford Motor Contests closes on the last of this month which just barely leaves camera fans time to make a unmber of good shots, get them finished and printed, and entered in the contest.

First prize is a new Ford Fordor sedan, and there are many other substantial cash prizes.

There are no restrictions or special requirements, no box-tops to worry about. The only requirement is that the picture shall show all or a recognizable part of the Ford exhibit.

E. M. Ludlam, conductor of the Better Photography Magazine World's Fair Camera Tours, which makes a daily tour of the Fair grounds with amateur camera fans in tow offers the following suggestions as to how to make prize-winning photographs for this contest:

"Evidently, the Ford people mean what they say about showing a 'recognizable part,' of the Ford exhibit, judging from the prize-winning pictures so far published, and photographers should bear this in mind when composing their pictures.

The first prize winner in the May contest is an excellent deep-filter shot of the loading platform with a strong cloud formation, the feature of the picture being the fact that the Ford, Lincoln and Zephyr flags are flying wide open and easily readable. This is not a particularly beautiful composition from the standpoint of 'art,' but it shows what the Ford people want and how prizes will be awarded, and that is the important thing.

"The best shots of this type I can suggest are (1) from the left of the exhibit as you approach it, with these flags and the Theme Center in the background (2) various views of the front of the building with the Iron Man, the V-8 or the flags prominent and plenty of clouds, (3) a shot of the building from the Aviation statue, including the word FORD in the picture, and various interior views definitely including some identifying trademark. Don't skip the trademark, no matter how pretty the picture looks without
